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## 1. The Delftse methode

The Delftse methode is a course that enables participants to acquire a sizeable vocabulary in a short space of time. Initially you will concentrate on learning the words that occur most frequently in the Dutch language. Those words will be learnt from the texts that are central to the Delftse methode language learning approach. The texts cover a wide range of topics related to Dutch society and they provide an extensive and varied array of linguistic structures. You will actually be learning the language through these texts. Before going to lessons all course participants are expected to thoroughly study the relevant texts so that they are then able to converse on the subjects covered in those same texts.

During the lessons, attention is entirely devoted to conversation. What has been learnt in the texts will be immediately put into practice. That is why we only speak Dutch during the lessons. You will be expected to talk with your fellow course participants under the supervision of an experienced lecturer. Each lesson will be rounded off with a computerized test in the language laboratory. The test will instantly indicate whether you are sufficiently conversant with the text.

## 2. Which courses to follow?

You can do courses with us at any required level. In the case of the beginners' courses and the intermediate level courses you can either choose to follow the intensive daytime course or you can opt for the less intensive evening courses. All the remaining courses are given in the daytime.

If you do not know any Dutch you can either follow the intensive course for Beginners or the less intensive Elementary I course. Prior to embarking on these beginners' courses there will be an introductory lesson in which you will receive detailed instructions on the Delftse methode approach and on how you can prepare for the lessons.

If you know a little Dutch you must first sit a level test (à € 30). To make an appointment for a test please go to the secretary's office. The result will indicate which level is most suitable for your purposes.

If you are in possession of an NT2-II ('National Examination') certificate then you can follow one of the scientific language courses or the language course for architects. These courses are described in the following pages.

TUD students and exchange students may register for the elective evening courses Elementary I (wm1115tu), II (wm1116tu) and Intermediate I (wm1117)

### **Future bachelor students**

The intensive courses are the most suitable courses for foreign students who are registered as fulltime students and are about to start on a bachelor's programme. Such students have one year at the very most in which to prepare for their studies.

Before registering to study at TU Delft one must at least have sat and passed the relevant Scientific Language course (4<sup>th</sup> level) or Architectural Terminology course. Those who are about to embark on studies within the faculties of Civil Engineering and Chemical Technology will be given a supplementary syllabus on which they will be tested.

### 3. The courses

#### Beginners courses

What do you do if you need a doctor? How can you buy a train or bus ticket? What are the opening hours for shops and what kinds of schools can people attend in the Netherlands? These everyday subjects (which are also relevant to "inburgering") are dealt with in the Green Book, the textbook for beginners.

The Green Book and the accompanying audio-cd's and cd-rom, contain 45 texts. These texts include the 1200 most common words in the Dutch language, the words that you will therefore need to use most often. From the very beginning, all the grammatical structures of the language form an integral part of the reading matter. Lessons are chiefly devoted to conversation practice. This means that within a very short space of time you will be able to converse reasonably well in the Dutch language. The objective is to simultaneously develop listening and speaking skills.

Multimedia teaching, practice and test material is freely available to course participants via the faculty's network.

#### Intensive or Elementary?

The entire Green Book is worked through in the space of five weeks during the intensive course. You will have lessons four days a week. This is a very intensive course which means that you cannot afford to miss any of the lessons!

The Elementary courses are less intensive. The lessons for these courses are given twice a week between 16.30 and 20.00 and also in the mornings between 8.30 and 9.30 provided that enough people register. Each of the Elementary courses lasts for 7 weeks. During the Elementary I course you will be required to study the first half of the Green Book. The last half of the book will be dealt with in Elementary II.

#### Beginners' Course (intensive)

<i>Final level</i>	Comparable with CEF-level A2. You will be able to have simple conversations.
<i>Course duration</i>	5 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	2 lessons of approx. 1 hour per day, except on Wednesdays. After each lesson there is a listening test for half an hour in the computer language laboratory.
<i>Introductory meeting</i>	During the introductory meeting you will be told how to work with the Delftse Methode and how to prepare for your lessons. It is not only advisable but also compulsory to come to this meeting! Students who did not show up at the introductory meeting will be deleted from the list.
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 40 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	For all beginners
<i>Course expenses</i>	€ 725 excluding lesson material; prospective TU students € 425
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 1, (2, 3); discman/computer

## Elementary Course I & Elementary Course II

<i>Final level</i>	<b>Elementary I</b> : Comparable to CEF-level A1. <b>Elementary II</b> : Comparable to CEF-level A2. You will be able to have simple conversations.
<i>Course duration</i>	<b>Elementary I</b> : 7 weeks <b>Elementary II</b> : 7 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	2 lessons of around 1 hour per week on Monday or Tuesday and on Thursday. After each lesson there is a half-hour listening test in the computer language laboratory.
<i>Introductory meeting</i>	<b>Elementary I</b> : During the introductory meeting you will be told how to work with the Delftse Methode and how to prepare for your lessons. It is not only advisable but also compulsory to come to this meeting! Students who did not show up at the introductory meeting will be deleted from the list
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 8 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	<b>Elementary I</b> : for all beginners For Master's students and exchange students, elective course (wm1115). (Except architecture exchange students) <b>Elementary II</b> : [For those who score high enough in the Elementary I end of course test or in the level test.] For Master's students and exchange students, elective course (wm1116).
<i>Course expenses</i>	<b>Elementary I</b> : € 355 excluding lesson material <b>Elementary II</b> : € 355 excluding lesson material

### Intermediate course II (non intensive)

How do the Dutch live? What is their country like? What are their views and how have their views changed over the years? How is the country governed? These and many other topics are dealt with in the 45 texts contained in the Yellow Book. The texts include the 1200 words covered in the beginners' course together with some 1700 new words. Again, these texts present all kinds of grammatical structures. The lessons are devoted to discussing the subjects presented in the texts. Listening and speaking proficiency is further developed and simple writing assignments have to be done.

### Intensive or Intermediate?

During the intensive course the Second Round course book will be worked through in the space of 5 weeks. There will be lessons four times a week. As it is an intensive course you cannot afford to miss any of the lessons!

The Intermediate courses, which are given twice a week between 16.30 and 20.00, are less intensive. Each of the Intermediate courses continues for 7 weeks. During the Intermediate I course participants will be required to study the first part of the Second Round textbook. The second half of the book will be studied in the Intermediate II course.

### The Second Round (intensive)

<i>Final level</i>	Equivalent to CEF-level B1. After having completed this course you will be reasonably well equipped to take part in discussions on non-specialist issues. You will furthermore have gained a degree of proficiency in basic writing skills.
<i>Course duration</i>	5 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	2 lessons lasting around 1 hour per day, except on Wednesdays. One is furthermore required to spend around 30 minutes per lesson on computer-programmed listening tests.
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 40 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	By means of the standard test (and an interview with one of the teachers), on the basis of high enough Green Book test results or on the basis of a good enough Elementary II final grade.
<i>Course expenses</i>	€ 725 excluding lesson material; for prospective TU students € 425
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 1, 4 (3, 5, 6)
<i>Self-study</i>	Is possible: € 25 examination fee due no later than 7 days before the test. Cost for using the computer language laboratory: € 95.

### Intermediate I & Intermediate II

<i>Final level</i>	<b>Intermediate I:</b> Equivalent to CEF-level B1.1. <b>Intermediate II:</b> Equivalent to CEF-level B1.2. After having completed this course you will be reasonably well equipped to take part in discussions on non-specialist issues. You will furthermore have gained a degree of proficiency in basic writing skills.
<i>Course duration</i>	<b>Intermediate I:</b> 7 weeks <b>Intermediate II:</b> 7 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	2 lessons of around 1 hour per week on Monday or Tuesday and on Thursday. After each lesson there is a half-hour listening test in the computer language laboratory.
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 8 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	<b>Intermediate I:</b> On the basis of a level test, a good enough Green Book exam result or if your final result for the Elementary II course is acceptable. An elective course for MSc and exchange students (wm1117). <b>Intermediate II:</b> After having completed Intermediate I or after gaining the right grade in the level test.
<i>Course expenses</i>	<b>Intermediate I:</b> € 355 excluding lesson material <b>Intermediate II:</b> € 355 excluding lesson material
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 1, 4 (3, 5, 6)
<i>Self-study</i>	Is possible: € 25 examination fee due no later than 7 days before the test. Costs for using the computer language laboratory: € 95.

## Advanced level course, "The Third Round"

The textbook for the Third Round has 10 blocks, each of which contains two to three texts on themes pertaining to the Netherlands, such as: environmental planning, famous Dutch people or the Golden Age. By this stage the texts will have become more specialized and once again, during the lessons, the various passages will be discussed. During the course each participant is expected to give four different independently prepared oral presentations. Each course participant is also expected to submit four fairly long written assignments. The presentations and written assignments constitute part of the final test and, as such, must be of a high enough standard for the participant to pass the test. Clearly it is therefore not possible to prepare for this final test exclusively on the basis of self-study.

### The Third Round

<i>Final level</i>	The level, depending on your particular results, will be equivalent to or slightly below that of the NT2-II State Examination. (CEF C1). After having followed this course you should be able to converse competently, read newspaper and journal articles and understand most television programmes. You will also be equipped to follow higher vocational education and university courses. Speakers of a Germanic language, but also others, may well have become proficient enough in Dutch to successfully complete non-technical university or higher vocational education studies.
<i>Course duration</i>	4 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	Three days a week (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) 1 lesson lasting around 2½ hours and a half-hour listening test in the computer language laboratory.
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 40 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	On the grounds of the level test or successful Second Round test results. If you want to be admitted to this course on the basis of your level test results or on the strength of self-study (Second Round course material) you will first need to request an intake interview with one of the lecturers. The interviewer will determine whether your spoken language proficiency is up to standard for the course.
<i>Course expenses</i>	€ 725 excluding lesson material; for prospective TU students € 425
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 1, 2, 4, (3, 5, 6)
<i>Self-study</i>	Not possible

## Preparing for the NT2-II State Exam

The admission requirements adhered to by certain institutions outside Delft University of Technology is: the NT2-II State Exam. Anyone who has successfully completed the Third Round (Derde Ronde) course may prepare for the State Exam by following this course. Participants will be familiarised with the examination method and given the opportunity to complete mock examinations. Commencement date, course duration and price to be announced on our website. ## Scientific Language Course

When preparing to embark on a technical study of any sort it is not sufficient to be generally competent in the Dutch language. You also need to have an active knowledge of academic terminology. This course is designed for those aiming to embark on technological university careers. (this does not include aspiring Architecture students: see Dutch for students of architecture). The relevant textbook contains texts which relate to mathematical topics and to Physics (subjects dealt with at Dutch secondary schools), and texts on technological subjects covered in first year courses for engineers such as: automation, the design process, business processes and technological development models. In the lessons you learn how to discuss solutions and processes and how to explain experiments, both in spoken and in written language. Students are, furthermore, trained in listening to fast spoken Dutch. This course is also very intensive.

As the group is often small, instead of the full course, we usually run a programme consisting of supported independent study (2 lessons a week)

Scientific Language Course	
<i>Final level</i>	The course participant will be able to benefit from technical university education; he/she can now enrol as a student at the Delft University of Technology (to study any subject except for Civil Engineering and Chemical Engineering), and with the exception of aspiring Architecture students, see the course on Architecture terminology.
<i>Course duration</i>	5 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	Three times a week 1 lesson of around 2½ hours and a half hour listening test in the computer language laboratory (if the number of participants is too limited, an alternative lesson program will be offered).
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 40 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	By virtue of the level test, or if the final Third Round test results are good enough, or else upon production of an NT2-II diploma (passes in all sections).
<i>Course expenses</i>	€ 725 excluding lesson material; for aspirant TU-students € 425 If insufficient participants register, a programme of guided self study is offered (Course fee € 205).
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 7, 11
<i>Self-study</i>	Is possible: € 25 examination fee due no later than 7 days before the test.

## Dutch for students of Architecture

Aspiring Architecture students are expected to prepare for their course by following the special Architecture Terminology course rather than by following the above-mentioned general engineering language course. In this course, which is designed for architecture students, participants are required to study texts, with the help of audio-visual aids, which focus on some 11 architectural topics such as movements in Dutch architecture, building techniques and construction management. Participants will be given a large relevant vocabulary that will be practised during conversation lessons. Listening proficiency will also be intensively practised and tested. As the group is often small, instead of the full course, we usually run a programme consisting of supported independent study (2 lessons a week)

<b>Dutch for students of architecture</b>	
<i>Final level</i>	The participant will be able to follow courses given within the faculty of Architecture in the Dutch language and may thus register for that particular course.
<i>Course duration</i>	4 weeks
<i>Number of lessons</i>	3 days a week, 2,5 hour lessons including listening tests in the computer language laboratory.
<i>Study load</i>	Around 40 hours per week
<i>Participation</i>	Via the placement test, on the basis of satisfactory results in the Third Round (Derde Ronde) test or upon production of the NT2-II certificate (all parts satisfactory).
<i>Course expenses</i>	€ 725 excluding lesson material; aspiring TU-students: € 425. If insufficient participants register, a programme of guided self-study is offered (Course fee € 205).
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material nos. 8, 9, 10
<i>Self-study</i>	Is possible; € 25 examination fee due no later than 7 days before the test.

## Special courses for students intending to study one of the following subjects: Civil Engineering, Chemical Engineering or Materials Science

These compulsory self-study courses, prepare prospective students even more specifically for their chosen fields of study at the university. The already established vocabulary will be extended by introducing the most recurrent subject-specific terms of the first study year in these four particular areas of study. Video material is also available.

<b>Civil Engineering, Chemical Engineering or Materials Science</b>	
<i>Final level</i>	The course participant will be able to benefit from lectures given in the above-mentioned fields of study.
<i>Course duration</i>	not relevant
<i>Number of lessons</i>	not relevant
<i>Study workload</i>	Around 150 hours
<i>Participation</i>	If the points gained in the Scientific Language test are high enough, by arrangement through the administration department.
<i>Course expenses</i>	not relevant
<i>Lesson material</i>	See lesson material; nos. 12, 13 depending on study
<i>Self-study</i>	The test is free of charge (by appointment with the administration department)

## Summer course

This is a highly intensive summer programme which has been set up especially for those who are very proficient in German, Swedish, Norwegian, Danish or Icelandic. The program includes a crash Beginners' course (two weeks) immediately followed by a fast "Second Round" course (of three weeks) and the Advanced level course (of three weeks), "the Third Round". Should there be an insufficient number of participants, the programme will be slightly adapted, still aiming at the proficiency levels described.

### Future Bachelor students

Those wishing to study at the Delft University of Technology must be in possession of a "letter of acceptance". The Student Facility Centre issues such declarations to those who meet the entrance conditions laid down by the university. The declaration also stipulates in which subjects supplementary entrance tests have to be completed before one is able to gain entrance to the TU Delft. At the Student Facility Centre you will receive a registration pack. This pack always contains a registration card and the "letter of acceptance". Our secretaries need this to be able to register Bachelor students in our language courses. The "letter" of acceptance will entitle you to a reduction of 30% for each level. Please send this document to our secretaries' office and transfer the costs to our bank account. See the section titled "Payment" for more information.

### Students with a TUD student pass

There are no costs involved for TUD students following the Elementary I and II and Intermediate I courses. These candidates can register at the secretaries' office with a valid university card. The procedure for Elementary 1 can be found on our website [www.delftsemethode.nl](http://www.delftsemethode.nl) and on Blackboard.

## Important Payment conditions

- A.** It is **not** possible to pay the course fee in instalments or to only pay part of the fee!
- B.** Only under special conditions may those who fail to pass the tests set for either the first or the second part of the Beginners' course follow **one** of these course parts at no extra expense. If, afterwards, one still wishes to redo part of the course, one must pay € 725 for it again.
- C.** Should one only wish to re-sit the examination, one must pay, as of the third time of sitting it and, at the very latest, seven days before the examination, a sum of € 25 at the secretaries' office.
- D.** Those who fail to participate in, or who only partly attend the courses for which they have registered may not expect fee restitution.
- E.** If you do not attend the introduction meeting of the Beginners course, or the first meeting of the other courses, you will lose your right to take part in the course.

## **9. How to get there?**

### **By public transport from Delft Central Station**

By train to Delft station. Take bus number 129, destination Rotterdam or TU Delft, or number 69, destination Tanthof ('oost'). The buses depart from the front of the train station, on the left-hand side after leaving the railway station, and the journey takes about five minutes. Get off at the bus stop 'Aula' and walk back in the direction the bus came from. The Jaffalaan is the first street on the left. Jaffalaan number five is the grey building on your left-hand side, it is easy to recognize and has a nameplate next to the front door.

Taxis are also available at the station; the taxi stand is directly in front of the railway station.

### **By car and coming from the Rotterdam or the The Hague direction:**

A13/E19: Motorway the Hague - Rotterdam, exit 'Delft Zuid'. When you reach the top of the flyover, keep to the right and follow the direction 'TU-wijk'. Turn to the right where the flyover ends. It's called the Schoemakerstraat at this point. Take the third street on the left: C. Huygensstraat. At the end of the street turn right into Mekelweg and take the second street on the left; this brings you to the Jaffalaan. The sub-faculty of Systems Engineering, Policy Analysis and Management is the second building on the left-hand side; it can be recognized by its grey colour and the nameplate next to the front door.
